ATTR polyneuropathy symptom checklist

This checklist provides a list of signs and symptoms associated with the rare autosomal dominant disease ATTR polyneuropathy (ATTR-PN) which is often underdiagnosed or misdiagnosed.¹ The results of the checklist will help you decide whether ATTR-PN should be considered in the differential diagnosis of these patients. A positive genetic test of a *TTR* gene mutation along with presentation of these symptoms can confirm a diagnosis of ATTR-PN.¹
